

When it comes to issues of security for minorities in Kosovo, the Kosovo Police (KP) is responsible as the first responder, EULEX as the second and KFOR as the third responder.

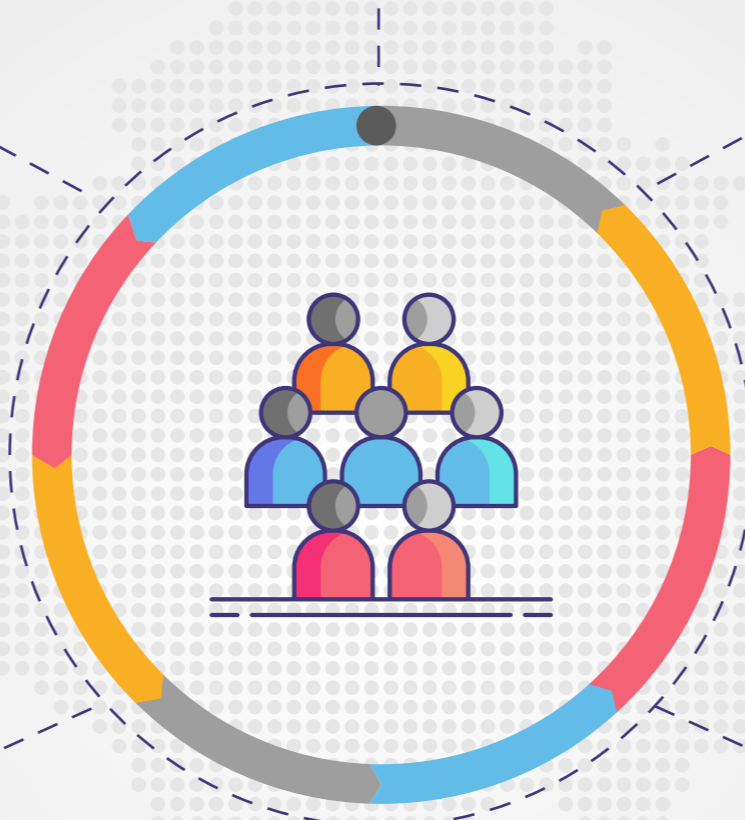


In Kosovo, there are eight ethnic groups, Albanians as the majority and seven that are recognized as official minorities: Serbs, Bosniaks, Ashkali, Egyptians, Gorani and Roma (Kosovo Agency of Statistics, 2012)



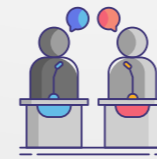
The strategic document regulating the relations in the field of security is the Kosovo Security Strategy 2022-2027

The Law on Police (Law No. 03/L - 035) in Article 34.4 stipulates the following: "The ethnic composition of the Police Officers assigned within a municipality shall, to the extent possible, reflect the ethnic composition of the population within the municipality".



One of the main tasks of the Security Committee is to exercise parliamentary control and supervision of the rule of law in institutions from the security sector

Due to the tense events in the north of Kosovo and that the members of the Serbian ethnicity have quit, the ethnic composition in the north is not in accordance with Article 34.4 of the Law on Police



The political body responsible for security issues is the Parliamentary Committee on Security and Defense Affairs



The Parliamentary Committee on Security and Defense Affairs has permanent members, and a representative of Serbian ethnicity has a guaranteed place in it
